Manuscript Formatting and Styling Recommendations

The manuscript should follow the following structure: title, abstract, keywords, introduction, materials and methods, results and discussions, conclusions, acknowledgements and references. Manuscript language should be English. Manuscript's size should not exceed 7 pages. Recommended font for the text is Times New Roman, font size – 11pt, except the reference section, which should be -10 pt. Line spacing should be single for the entire manuscript. Text should be justified. Make sure that the text is prepared in Microsoft Word © 2003 editor, the page size should be A4, 2 mm size should be set for top, bottom, left and right margins.

Title: number of words should not be more than 18. Font for the title should be Calibri, all caps and bold, size should be 16 pt. Place the text in the center. Avoid using abbreviations.

Author/authors and affiliations: indicate the first name(s), last name(s), institution, city name, country name and e-mail address. Present the authors' affiliation below the names. Indicate all affiliations with numbers after the author's name with *Italic*. Indicate the corresponding author's name by using a superscript bullet (*) after the name. Use font Calibri, size 14 pt for the author(s) name(s) and 10 pt for the affiliation(s). Place the text in the center.

Abstract: an expected size of the abstract is 150 - 200 words. Font size should be 10 pt. Try to avoid citations in this section of the manuscript.

Keywords: provide up to 6 words and/or phrases. Font size should be 10 pt. Avoid abbreviations.

Introduction: the Introduction should provide readers with the background information needed to understand your study, and the reasons why you conducted your experiments. The Introduction should answer the question: what question/problem was studied?

Materials and methods: this section should provide the reader with all the details of how you conducted your study.

Results and discussions: the Results should simply state what you found; the Discussion should describe the significance of your findings in light of what was already known about the research problem being investigated. Discuss what your results may mean for researchers in other fields, and the general public. How could your findings be applied?

Conclusions: this section should provide the reader with the conclusions on question/problem you studied.

Acknowledgements: place the acknowledgements before the reference list as a separate section. Provide the full name of the funding source and grant number.

References: be ensured that every citation given in the text is also listed in the reference section and vice versa. Use number(s) in square brackets [2], [5,8], [1,2,5] in the text and in the reference list. Number the references list in sequences in which they appear in the text.

Tables and table captions: tables should be submitted as editable text in Word Document. There is no necessity to submit it as a separate file. Caption(s) should be placed above the table. Mark table captions as **Tab.1.**, use **(Tab.1)** in the text.

Figures and figure captions: resolution of the figure should be not less than 300 dpi. Figure(s) should be submitted in the text with .jpg, tiff, .bmp or .gif file extensions. Make sure that texts are readable on the figures. Figure caption(s) should be placed below the figure(s). Mark figure captions as **Fig.1.**, use **(Fig.1)** in the text.
